Latinos were first included in large numbers into the US through the defeat of Mexico in the Mexican- American war

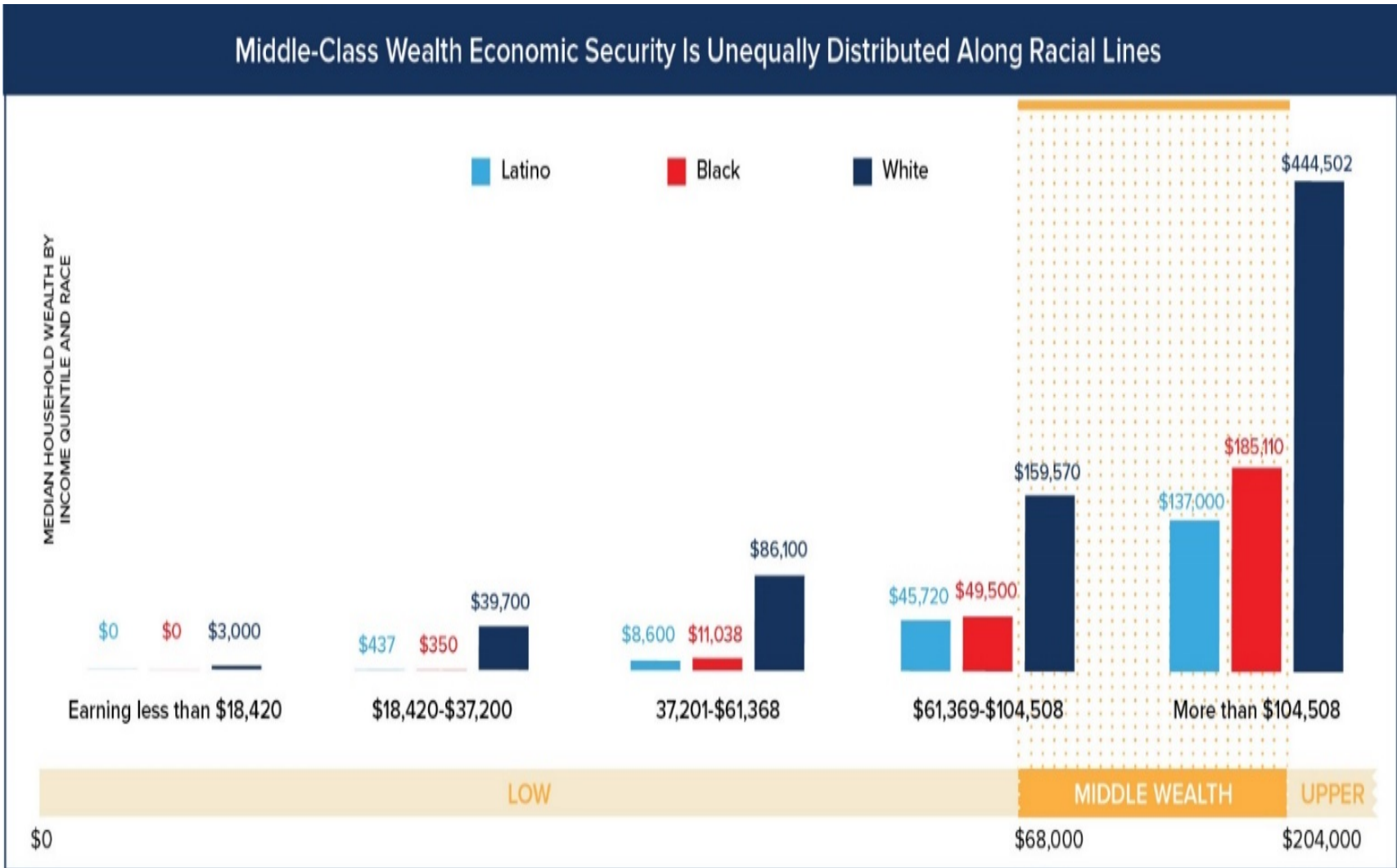

The Reality of the End of the Civil Rights Movement

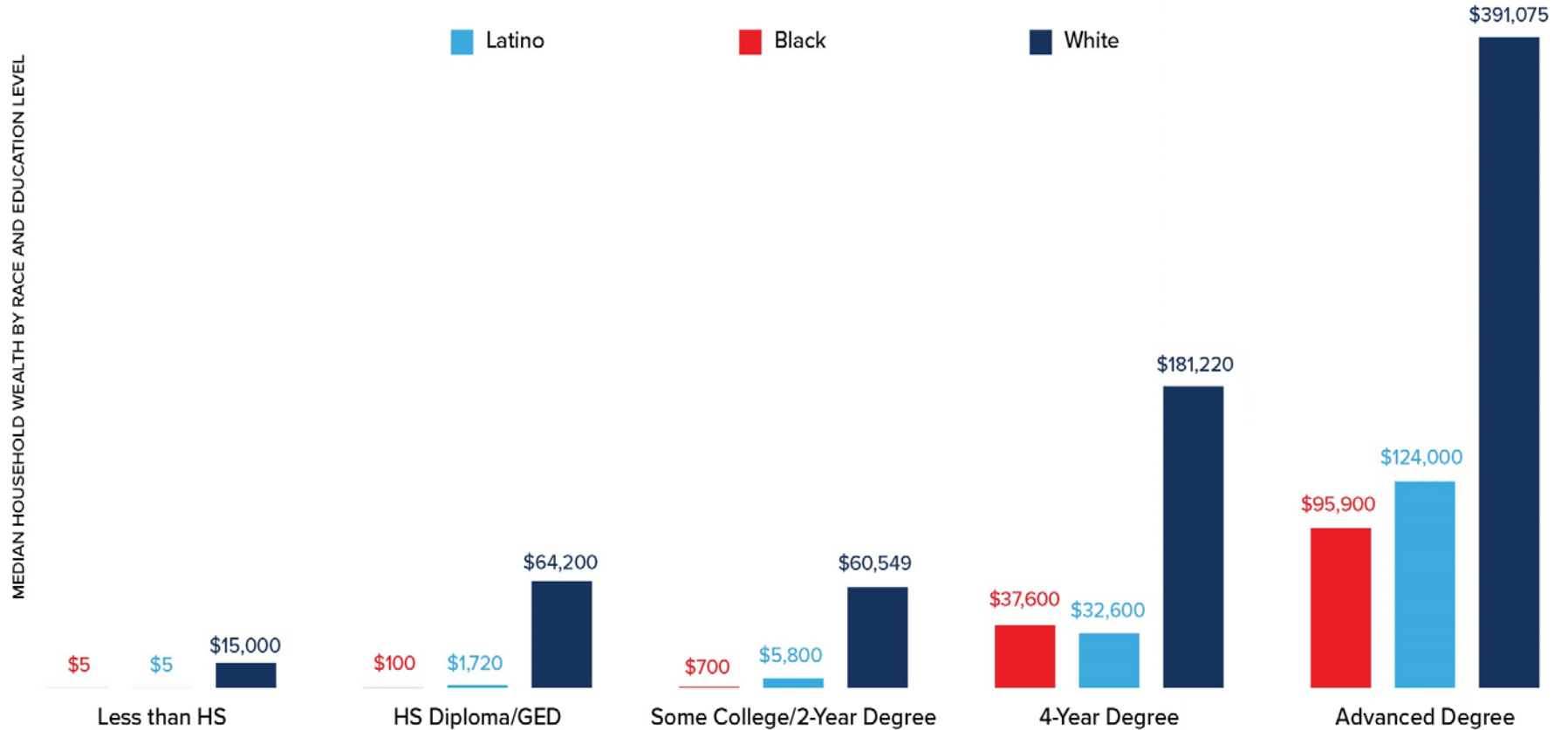


The Disconnect Between Income and Wealth
